

1 A. As far as I understood, yes, ma'am.

2 Q. Now, to your knowledge, while you were teaching  
3 that first or second year, did the Defendant have a baby?

4 A. Yes, ma'am, she did.

5 Q. What was your impressions of the Defendant those  
6 first two years when you were still a teacher of her and  
7 her demeanor?

8 A. She was always very nice, very quiet. I didn't  
9 know Joelle very well at all. Just, you know, being  
10 around her in meetings and things, but she was always  
11 very nice and quiet.

12 Q. Did she dress appropriately for school?

13 A. Yes, ma'am.

14 Q. Did she dress conservatively?

15 A. I would say so, yeah.

16 Q. Now, did anything about her -- Did you ever  
17 notice anything about her change as you stayed at that  
18 school?

19 A. I never saw Mrs. Ogletree much at school. I'm  
20 sure her dress changed. I don't know if it was styles  
21 changing or, you know, how that went. I know that some  
22 of the things that -- You know, some of the things she  
23 wore were different later on than they were in the  
24 beginning but --

25 Q. Were they less conservative than they were in

1 the beginning?

2 A. I guess so.

3 Q. And I'm not trying to ask you to be an expert on  
4 fashion. I understand that.

5 So you basically had very limited  
6 interaction with the Defendant?

7 A. Yes, ma'am.

8 Q. That wasn't part of your job?

9 A. No, not when I was teaching. I mean, we would  
10 have to be in faculty meetings together and things like  
11 that and we were around each other in faculty meetings  
12 but we didn't have, like I say, much time. We didn't see  
13 each other much.

14 Q. Mrs. Warren, if I can take you to around October  
15 of 2002.

16 A. Yes, ma'am.

17 Q. Was a situation brought to your attention  
18 involving the Defendant and some students?

19 A. Yes, ma'am.

20 Q. What was brought to your attention, without  
21 going into any detail of what anybody said?

22 A. A student came to my office and stated that --

23 Q. I'm going to ask you don't go into directly what  
24 they said, but just in general what was brought to your  
25 attention?

1                   Go ahead, Mr. Beasley.

2                   MR. BEASLEY: Thank you, Your Honor.

3                   CROSS-EXAMINATION CONTINUED

4 BY MR. BEASLEY:

5           Q. Mrs. Warren, I want to talk about your testimony  
6 on Direct concerning my client's dress and demeanor  
7 during the first year as a teacher. Do you remember  
8 that?

9           A. For the most part, yes, sir.

10          Q. I believe you said that sometime during that  
11 first year she was pregnant?

12          A. No, sir, that's not what I said.

13          Q. What did you say?

14          A. She asked me if in the first or second year did  
15 I know that she had had a baby, and I said yes, sir, I  
16 knew.

17          Q. So during the first or second year of her time  
18 there as a teacher she had a baby?

19          A. Yes, sir.

20          Q. Was she, in fact, pregnant during her first  
21 year?

22          A. I don't remember which year it was, sir. I know  
23 she was pregnant at some point. I just --

24          Q. And would you agree with me that pregnant women  
25 dress a little different than when they're not?

1 A. Oh, yes, sir. Most definitely.

2 Q. When you said that -- I'm not really sure what  
3 you said. Are you saying to this jury that her dress  
4 changed at some point?

5 A. A little.

6 Q. A little?

7 A. But everybody's changes a little.

8 Q. I think you mentioned that it might be because  
9 of styles --

0 A. Right.

1 Q. -- changing; is that right?

2 A. Right.

3 Q. So whatever change you observed, you would  
4 describe it as a little?

5 A. Yes, sir. I never saw Joelle much.

6 Q. I believe that the change that you're telling  
7 this jury that you observed was based on you seeing her  
8 outside of school?

9 A. Or seeing her at school. I didn't see her very  
0 often at school. I never saw her outside of school very  
1 often. Once in a blue moon maybe at the post office or  
2 something, in a car.

3 Q. Did you ever see her wear anything inappropriate  
4 at school?

5 A. Not that I'm aware of.

1 Q. What would happen, according to your  
2 understanding of the policies there at Glen Rose  
3 Independent School District, if a teacher were to show up  
4 wearing inappropriate attire?

5 A. My understanding is our building administrator  
6 would ask them to go change.

7 Q. They would not tolerate a teacher dressing  
8 inappropriately?

9 A. No, sir.

10 Q. Or provocatively?

11 A. No, sir.

12 Q. Back in October of 2002 you had an opportunity  
13 to meet with Chayce Wilson and Matt Brooks; is that  
14 correct?

15 A. Yes, sir.

16 Q. And when you met with those two boys, did you  
17 meet with them separately or together?

18 A. Separately.

19 Q. What was the purpose of meeting with them  
20 separately?

21 A. I just -- Usually, when I visit with a student,  
22 I visit with them by themselves. They tell me things  
23 that they don't want other people to know. It's a  
24 confidentiality issue.

25 Q. When you met with Chayce, did you explain to him
