

1 high school at that time; is that correct?

2 A. When the boys had a sleep over at the house?

3 Q. Yes. Are you unaware of that?

4 THE COURT: You can answer that question he  
5 just asked you.

6 A. Part of that is confidential.

7 THE COURT: Go onto the second question  
8 then.

9 Q. (By Mr. Beasley) Not confidential regarding Matt  
10 or Chayce, correct?

11 A. Yes, he was a teacher at the time.

12 Q. And you were aware -- Were you aware that there  
13 was a sleep over at the Ogletree's house?

14 A. I can't discuss what's told to me in  
15 confidentiality.

16 Q. Let me put it to you this way, ma'am. If it's  
17 somebody other than Matt or Chayce, I don't want you to  
18 tell me the person's name.

19 A. Okay. Yes, I was aware.

20 Q. And were you aware that only boys were at that  
21 sleep over?

22 A. No, sir.

23 Q. What was your understanding?

24 A. Boys and girls.

25 Q. Would you think it would be a good idea to have

1 boys and girls together at that age for a sleep over?

2 A. That would be hard for me to say, sir, because  
3 when I did the theater, we had a lock-in and I had boys  
4 and girls at the high school and we worked all night on  
5 our play. It wasn't necessarily a sleep over. It was,  
6 we went in there and worked. So I had boys and girls  
7 together.

8 Q. So it's not unusual at Glen Rose High School for  
9 good teachers who care about their students to socialize  
10 and to interact with their students outside of the  
11 classroom?

12 A. No, sir.

13 Q. And it was encouraged, in fact, at Glen Rose  
14 School District for teachers to be hands on, to care  
15 about their students and to use unique and innovative  
16 ways to help students learn and to mentor them; is that  
17 correct?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. And one of the things that you used was a  
20 lock-in; is that correct?

21 A. Yes, sir.

22 Q. And that was fairly common there at the school  
23 district, was it not?

24 A. I don't know if it was necessarily common but it  
25 had been done before.

1 Q. Did you get in trouble from the school --

2 A. No.

3 Q. -- when you did that?

4 A. No, sir.

5 Q. Was the administration aware of it?

6 A. Yes, sir, they were.

7 Q. They didn't have any problem with you doing that  
8 with boys and girls?

9 A. No, sir, they didn't have a problem. We were at  
10 the school.

11 Q. I believe you testified on Direct that you aware  
12 of the allegations against my client?

13 A. Yes, sir, a little.

14 Q. You are?

15 A. I believe so.

16 Q. How did you become aware of those?

17 A. I read the Indictment in the newspaper last year  
18 or year before. Whenever.

19 Q. That's how you became aware of the accusations,  
20 isn't it?

21 A. Well, I mean, I knew what I had been apart of  
22 but then I saw in the newspaper that she had been  
23 indicted.

24 Q. Right. But what you were involved in was  
25 different than what you read in the newspaper, wasn't it?

1 A. What I was involved in was just reporting.  
2 That's all I was involved in.

3 Q. Right. But what I'm saying is, is that your  
4 understanding of the allegations against her, you didn't  
5 get that from talking to those two boys that day. You  
6 got it from reading it in the Indictment in the  
7 newspaper. Isn't that true?

8 A. Yes, sir.

9 MR. BEASLEY: I'll pass the witness.

10 REDIRECT EXAMINATION

11 BY MS. LAMB:

12 Q. Mrs. Warren, just a few questions to follow-up  
13 on. You talked about -- Mr. Beasley asked you about the  
14 lock-in at the school?

15 A. Yes, sir -- Yes, ma'am. Excuse me.

16 Q. That's fine. Did you have to get approval to do  
17 that?

18 A. I did, yes.

19 Q. Who did you get approval from?

20 A. From my principal.

21 Q. Mr. Harris?

22 A. The first year I did, it was Mr. Stults. The  
23 second year was Mr. Harris.

24 Q. Now, go back to that October 1st day. Did Matt  
25 and Chayce come to your office voluntarily?
